FOUNDER'S DAY 2022

A MESSAGE FROM THE HEAD

Dear Parents,

Thank you to all of you who supported our Founder's Day this weekend. It was though disheartening that a number of requests were made for students to miss this event. The date for next year is Saturday 17th June so please mark this in your diaries now and do all you can to avoid other engagements that day. Being a member of a school is to be part of a community. Founder's Day is one where we all come together to mark the contribution of those who have come before us and played their part in making the School what it is today. Being part of the School is not just a case of turning up to lessons and those activities that your child enjoys, it is important that all contribute to the community that the School is. It is similarly disheartening when children are provided with 'excuse notes' for the activities days that we hold. These are designed to be enjoyable days that bring the year group together and also help to develop the soft skills that are so important for future employment prospects. There is a compulsory programme of events that children in the School are expected to attend – these include the Founder's Day, Speech Day, Open Day and all activities days. All of these days are part of the overall number of days that we do as a school and all are compulsory. Speech Day this year will be in the evening of Thursday 8th September and again attendance will be compulsory so please avoid that date and next year's Founder's Day for any other engagements.

Thank you to all of those who came to Founder's Day – it was a splendid occasion and it was particularly good to welcome back those that left the School in 1970 for their reunion and they certainly appreciated the sense of community that such events give and these go across the generations. Founder's Day also recognises the contributions of all those who give to our bursary fund which supports 1 in 8 of the children in the Senior School. All of us benefit from working alongside those on bursaries who give so much to the School so recognising those that fund these is also important. You can read more about the bursary fund below.

You will know that it is rare that I use these notes to make such points but I ask that you respect all of these days that I have mentioned as being as important as any other school day. There is more below about the traditions of Founder's Day and I will write again at the start of the next academic year to again remind you of all of the dates which we expect children to attend school next year.

The final three weeks of term will again be very busy with much to look forward to including the Art Show, our Summer Music Festival and the production of 'Honk'. There are many individual successes also covered below and I congratulate our talented students for all that they are achieving. FOUNDER'S DAY



Having obtained a royal licence, our founder Dame Agnes Mellers, a shrewd and practical woman, proceeded to draw up a set of ordinances or rules for the proper conduct of her school. The longest section concerned an annual service of commemoration, which Dame Agnes wished to be held on 16 June in St Mary's Church. It was the intention of Dame Agnes that a solemn mass should be celebrated every year for the soul of her husband Richard Mellers and, after her death, for her own. It is believed that this mass was celebrated up until the abolition of ceremonies under Edward VI 35 years later. It may have resumed under Mary Tudor then vanished again under Elizabeth 1 in 1558, possibly in recognition of the vanity of using a religious institution for common advantages. The school historian A.W.Thomas noted that although prayers were said for the Founders, there was no sign that the ceremony took place again until it was revived as a Founder's Day Service in 1923. With the exception of the war years, Founder's Day has taken place each year since.


Thomas notes that the inspiration for the revival came from the Old Boy's Society under the chairman of Mr H.D.Snook. The War Memorial was just one year old and many Old Nottinghamians had been lost in the Great War. The ideas of tradition and continuity, vision and responsibility were more keenly felt than ever.

The event was further elaborated by the Mayor, Alderman E.L.Manning who was one of the school Governors. It was his suggestion to formally invite the guests to a 'bread, ale and cheese' event at the Exchange Building in the Market Square and, much to the interest of the morning city centre shoppers, a grand procession proceeded from St Mary's Church to the Market Square after the service.

This remained the model of Founder's Day until 2013 when the decision was made by the Headmaster and Governors to open the after- service celebration to the whole school community which required a bigger venue. It has been said that alongside Goose Fair, our Founder's Day is the oldest Nottingham custom still alive today.

Dame Agnes was very specific in her instructions so that money was not wasted. The Trustees of the school could spend 2/- (shillings) on bread, 8d(pence) on cheese and 16d on Ale. Leftovers were given to the poorest scholars. The Mayor was to receive 6d for attending and the Vicar for officiating. These gifts took the form of the payment of a groat. As leftovers became less likely in modern times, the school also chose to present a groat to a Representative Scholar. Today this is extended to both a female and a male scholar. The Vicar and Mayor tend to give their groats back.

Note: Dame Agnes Mellers strictly demanded that the Schoolmaster and others should not have potations (ale), nor (alcoholic) drinks more than twice a year. Presumably, our Founder's Day was considered one of those occasions.

Year 7 Trip to Newstead Abbey

The English Department, accompanied by Mrs Neale and Mrs Andrews, led a trip to Newstead Abbey for the whole of Year 7, following their end-of-year exams. Students were guided through a host of activities, including a workshop with local artist Hannah Sawtell and a creative writing session inspired by the eerie gothic architecture of the abbey's cloisters. As well as an outdoor photography challenge, students also enjoyed a tour around some of the most impressive rooms in the stately home and were given an insight into how Lord Byron, the most famous resident of Newstead Abbey, would have lived. They were particularly fascinated by the revolver kept beside his bed in case of unwanted intruders and some of his more eccentric behaviour! Students are now participating in a ghost story writing competition inspired by their visit and other creative activities following on from the experience.

Music Makers Award 2022

Our very own Ben S, amongst a very strong field of performers, has won the Music Makers Award by Carlton Male Voice Choir. News from the Development Office

Nottingham High School was founded with one legacy in 1513 and has been providing an outstanding education for over 500 years. A history built on benevolence; we are proud of our humble beginnings.


From the moment a student joins the School, their own journey begins through a house community inspired by philanthropy.

Our School Houses are named after four of our benefactors: Mellers', named after the School's Founder, Dame Agnes Mellers, Cooper's, named after Frederick Cooper, an artist who in 1872 donated almost two acres (8,100 m) of land to the School, Maples', named after Samuel Maples, a former pupil who bequeathed £3,000 to fund bursaries in 1882, and White's, after Sir Thomas White who endowed a charity to provide interest-free loans to "young men of good name and thrift".

Following the withdrawal of state funding in 1997, the School set up a bursary fund.

Thanks to a few generous Old Nottinghamians, the School's own contributions and a few local trusts and foundations, we are able to provide financial assistance to children of families who would otherwise be denied their opportunity of a High School education.

The Bursary Fund currently supports one in eight students across the School, to differing degrees.



Summer Training Programmes

We are into the final fitness training block of the year in the school Fitness Suite, and Summer Holidays training programmes are currently being created and will be available via Google Classroom for students to access.

Similar to last year, there will be programme templates for students to follow to prepare physically for Autumn Term rugby and hockey, but also general fitness training programmes to maintain, or even develop, strength and fitness levels over the long holiday period. There will be programmes suitable for those with full gym access, those who have some equipment and for those who will rely on training with bodyweight only. Training interventions provided by the school will always take into account previous experience (training age), underlying health issues and/or current/previous injuries, and both the chronological and biological ages of the students.

As a result of the work we put in throughout the year educating students on safe and appropriate fitness training interventions in Health-Related Fitness (HRF) blocks in PE, students should be familiar with the range of exercises provided. They should also feel confident in their abilities when working with external resistance (barbells, dumbbells and resistance machines). If, however, any parents or guardians have any concerns about youth resistance training, please do not hesitate to get in touch.

Strength training for adolescents

Professor Rhodri Lloyd, who is a Professor of Paediatric Strength and Conditioning at Cardiff Metropolitan University, has published three books and over 110 peer-reviewed manuscripts on the topic of strength and conditioning for children and adolescents. Alongside guidelines for training, he has often highlighted the benefits of, and dispelled some of the common misconceptions around strength training for youths:

Appropriate strength training for youths...

- Stimulates bone mineralisation
- Increases bone density
- Strengthens connective tissue
- Improves CV fitness
- Improves mental health and self-confidence
- Helps encourage lifelong engagement in fitness

Appropriate strength training for youths does not....

- Damage joints or growth plates
- Stunt growth or cause deformations
- Create muscle imbalances
- Have a higher risk of injury (than most sports)
- Adversely affect body image





There may be less talk about male body confidence – but it 's just as important!


