Despite the heat, many of our Year 12s recently completed their final Gold Duke of Edinburgh Award expeditions – both walking and canoeing – and it has been excellent to see their hard work and planning pay off. Since the holidays, all students have embarked on our Year 12 Skills Challenge, a competition that encourages them to explore new ideas and careers while developing their skills in communication, problem-solving and teamwork. For the first part of the challenge, students delivered presentations on a topic of their choice. Talks ranged from the style of Les Misérables to the shape of the universe, and the judges (made up of staff, parents and governors) were impressed by students' knowledge, enthusiasm and professionalism. This week, the focus is on mock interviews for a range of potential careers, and the challenge will culminate with a group task next week – we're looking forward to seeing the results! Following a series of talks about the UCAS process, all students are currently working on their UCAS personal statements, and undertaking preparation to support their next steps after A-level. Many have booked university open days over the coming weeks, and we hope that they enjoy these and gain further insights to aid their decision making.

FEATURE ARTICLE YEAR 8 CREATIVE DAY

On Friday 9th June, we welcomed visitors into the school for Creative Day, organised by Mr Spedding. What an amazing way to have some time out of academic study after the intensity of exams. The Year 8 team who how hard they have been working! 51 students went off-site to the Yorkshire Sculpture Park and the remaining students had the opportunity of taking part in a new experience for the day; Artisan Baking, Photography, Drumming, Robotics and a Musicals workshop. What followed was a day of fun, laughter, and in some cases some baked treats to take home! Miss Davis enjoyed talking to some Year 8s at lunchtime and we're delighted to include some of their blogs here:



At first, I was very hesitant about creative day as I was not sure if I would like robotics, as I did not have a lot of experience in this. However, I decided to give my 100% effort to learn about this. My group were looking at microbit which is developed by the BBC and it is a tiny computer which can do lots of various functions, and use other extensions like the kitronic. The kitronic allows the BBC microbit to move and also travel in lines, with also many more functions. Our main aim for creative day was to create a toxic waste disposal which can go through a cave and retrieve a toxic waste can. I thought that this idea was really cool and could not wait to get started! First of all, we all learned to move the robot. We did this by adding a few block code commands which did not take a lot of effort, and I found quite fun. We also set our bias for each wheel, to make sure the motor went forward at the same speed and not turning left or right. This is because both of the motors were not alike, and therefore had different resistance causing the unstraightness of the car. Adding a bias adds resistance to one wheel, which therefore makes it straighter. Our next task was to make the car, go through a track and stop at the end. This was quite hard, in my opinion. This is because we had to go through each turn, and tailor each of the turning time so it did not overturn and hit the cones. I did not think that this would by that fun, but however it actually turned out to be pretty good and me and my team finished it in second place! This goes to show if you put your mind to something, you can do anything! Our final task, was to make the car follow the line sensor. The coding for this was very hard as we had to figure out how to use the line sensor in the coding, and also make it move according to that. Luckily as this was guite hard the teachers guided us and instructed us with this, and then I really started to get the jist of it. However, when they verified that we had the right code, it still wasn't sensing the black line. This is because of the light reflecting onto the paint, so therefore the line sensor did not actually recognize the colour of the light. Therefore, we closed the light and it worked! I was really happy with this and also amazed at what robots can do. Overall, I think that this day was really good. I really think that this was also a good refresher, after all of the exams too! I would definitely do this again because I think that I was decent at this, and overall, I had lots of fun!



Creative day was amazing! I did artisan baking, and we made so many fun things! We made Chelsea Buns, a loaf of bread and also some chocolate truffles! It was incredible and I would love to do it again.

Year 8 Creative Day

I kickstarted the day with photography. We were first taught how to use Adobe Photoshop and remove backgrounds. Then we were off. We were set with the task of creating an impossible photo using photoshop, each one of us given a professional camera! I was on the lawns and ready to take some spectacular photos. I took close-up photos of plants, grass, and non-living organisms such as statues and rocks. Then we had to come back inside and edit our photos for the final product! Overall, an amazing experience and a bit of fun as well! After Lunch I had my drumming session which I thoroughly enjoyed. We started off by learning several ways to clap and shape it up into a rhythm. Next, we learned simple rhythms on a drum called the Djembe, Boom ba boom cha! Then we moved onto slightly more complex drums called the Dunun and learned simple rhythms. Finally, we split into two groups: one on the Djembes and the others on the Dununs. We recorded our performance and watched it at the end of the day! A superb learning experience for me, whilst also enjoying myself! Highly **Recommended!**

Journalism Club Y9 Art Day

The artist: Jeanette Barnes goes around the world to famous cities and then sketches out the cities usually in charcoal. Jeanette Barnes was born in Lancashire in 1961. She studied for BA Hons Fine Art Liverpool Polytechnic 1980-83, post-graduate painting Royal Academy Schools 1984-87 and MA printmaking Royal College of Art 1987-89. On the day, an artist named Jeanette Barnes came in to demonstrate the art of foam cutting. She got the year nines to draw some buildings based on photos of buildings, and then to draw an imaginary foreground, middleground, and background. She then cut out pieces of foam to make shapes, they had to make towers from these shapes but they had to balance so they had to think carefully of the shape and size of these cutouts. This activity gets you thinking about buildings and how they are structured as well as the shapes involved.

Year 10 Biology Perlethorpe Field Trip

In May we took the Year 10 biologists to the Perlethorpe Environmental Education Centre to develop their ecology skills and complete some required practical work for their GCSE course. The students investigated: the different plant species present in two areas (grassland and woodland); the effect of trampling and mowing on species distribution in a meadow: and the effect of pollution on aquatic invertebrates. The students particularly enjoyed this last activity, which involved entering a stream either upstream or downstream of a bridge, clad in their wellies, and then kicking up the sediment so they could use their nets to catch a sample of the species living there. The students also became proficient in using quadrats to sample plant species in various areas, comparing their findings as part of their study of the diversity of species living in different parts of the site. Gaining experience of gathering and analysing ecological data is invaluable in aiding student progress through this part of the course. This cohort were the most focused group we have ever taken to Perlethorpe, completing their work diligently and efficiently, and their exemplary conduct on the field trip was noted by the Centre staff. Year 8 Drumming

Y8 students recently had the opportunity to choose an activity during Y8 Creative Day. I, enjoying drums and the thought of an afternoon playing them, chose the African drumming workshop organized by a company called Unbeatable Energy. The workshop was led by a very enthusiastic instructor named Steve.

Throughout the workshop, Steve focused on teaching us the art of playing the diembe (and later, the dundun), some traditional African drums. We started off by doing a lot of clapping and I found out that I have been clapping incorrectly for the 13 years that I have been alive! Then, we started playing the diembe. We started off with some relatively simple rhythms and then slowly developed them into a multitude of rhythms. In this part, Steve taught us "The most important rhythm that you will ever learn" (his words not mine). Steve showed his real passion for drumming when he showed us some of his YouTube videos, including one where he tried to drum with cereal boxes.

We eventually created a piece which was filmed and showcased to the year at the end of the day. Overall, I really enjoyed this workshop and would recommend it to people next year.

Last Monday I had the pleasure of taking five Year 10 Community Action students to the Sri Guru Tegh Bahadur Gurdwara in Lenton to support the Guru Nanak's Mission in feeding the homeless. Mrs Stafford's Year 10 Food and Nutrition group did a fantastic job of preparing a vegetable chilli during their lesson that day, so we were simply left to take the food offerings to the temple and eventually into the city. Community Action students did an excellent job at the temple of preparing the individual portions, making dessert and ensuring each person who accessed the service that night received a healthy and hearty meal. We then headed into the city centre where we offered the food to those in need of a good meal. Students certainly had a good lesson in teamwork and working under pressure but most importantly, the importance of not judging someone based on first impressions.

Wonderdome Planetarium

It was great to make the most of the day visit from 'Wonder Dome' where they brought in an inflatable planetarium. This was initially the idea Hannah B (Year 13) as she wanted to take the Year 8 Astronomy Club out to Birmingham to see a planetarium show as a reward for their commitment over the past two years. Hannah assisted with the club last year while the students were Year 7 when it was started by Mr. Theodorakis, and has taken over running it this year for the students who have been very grateful. Hannah says "It's been a pleasure running Astronomy club following on from Mr Theodorakis' lead. The best activities we ran stemmed from the students' ideas - and I thank them for their creativity and dedication! Particular highlights have been the planetarium experience, designing and making a miniature Mars colony, and launching model rockets across the front lawn."

Instead of going to Birmingham, Hannah decided why not bring the planetarium to us instead?

We were then able to make the most of it by inviting in some local primary schools to enjoy a session in the dome, as well as students from our own infant and junior school.

Dr. Jowsey and I enjoyed joining the Astronomy Club for their lunchtime session where we were given a 3D tour of the universe, zooming out from Earth all the way to the edge of the observable Universe, where we were given a careful explanation of each point on the way. This ended with some information from astronauts Chris Hadfield and Tim Peake about some of the routine challenges of living on the International Space Station.



SPORTS HIGHLIGHTS

National School's Regatta

Anja won a Bronze medal at the National Schools' Regatta held on Dorney Lake, site of the 2012 Olympic Regatta. In the largest field of the whole regatta, 54 crews, Anja's crew (racing in a coxed quad) won the morning time trial by just 1 second from the previously unbeaten quad from Henley Rowing Club, which qualified the crew for the 'A final'.

This in itself was a magnificent achievement as Anja's crew had gone into the Regatta ranked outside the top 3 crews in the event.

Athletics roundup - Summer Term Highlights

Senior Boys

The senior boys athletics team have had three fixtures this half term. Twenty two boys have represented the school so far. The team opened with a fixture against Loughborough GS and won with a score of 122pts. The next fixture was against KES Birmingham, Mount St Mary's and Worksop College at Harvey Hadden. The boys won this event by over 20 points. The final fixture on Saturday 13th May was against Bromsgrove, Kings Worcester and KES Birmingham. The boys won again with a fantastic team performance to make it three wins out of three.

Senior Girls

The senior girls have had two fixtures this half term against Mount St Mary's and Loughborough GS. Many of the girls set seasons bests and will look forward to the fixtures after half term.

Year 10 Boys and Girls Athletics

Year 10 have had a busy start to the season. Both boys and girls won the city championships at Harvey Haddden. Twelve students have qualified for the county schools in June.

Year 10 boys won the English Schools cup round one at Newark and have qualified for the regional final. The boys team have also won fixtures against Loughborough GS, Bromsgrove, Kings Worcester, KES Birmingham and Ratcliffe College.

Year 8 Boys and Girls Athletics

Both these teams have qualified for the regional final of the English Schools Cup after qualifying from the county round in Newark. Year 8 boys finished second against KES Birmingham and Kings Worcester in early May and won against Loughborough GS in April.

In summary, over fifty students have represented the school this half term in Athletics fixtures, both mid - week and weekends. Equally impressive are the number of year 7 and 8 students who are attending after school athletics training on Monday evenings. After half term, there are another ten fixtures for these students to focus on and to improve their season or personal bests.



RECIPE

NOTTINGHAM

IDEAS

Gazpacho

Ingredients

- 250g passata
- 1 red pepper, deseeded and chopped
- 1 red chilli, deseeded and chopped
- 1 garlic clove, crushed
- 1 tsp sherry vinegar
- juice ½ lime
- 1 peeled cucumber & deseeded
- Drizzle olive oil
- Fresh basil Method

STEP 1

In a blender (or with a stick blender), whizz together the passata, red pepper, chilli, half a cucumber, garlic, sherry vinegar and lime juice until smooth. Season to taste, then put in the fridge to chill for an hour

STEP 2

• Cut the other half of your deseeded cucumber, chop 2 to 3 leaves of basil, then sprinkle your basil diced cucumber on top of your gazpacho. Drizzle olive oil on top then serve.

Hummus

Ingredients

- 400g can chickpeas
- 100ml lemon juice
- 150ml olive oil
- 125g tahini
- 5 cardamom pods
- toasted pine nuts
- 1 ½ tsp ground coriander

Tiramisu

Ingredients

- 3 tsp instant coffee granules
- 3 tbsp coffee liqueur
- 250g tub mascarpone
- 85g <u>condensed milk</u>
- 1 tsp <u>vanilla extract</u>
- 4-6 sponge fingers
- 1 tbsp cocoa powder

Method

STEP 1

Mix the coffee granules with 2 tbsp boiling water in a large jug and stir to combine. Add the coffee liqueur and 75ml cold water. Pour into a shallow dish and set aside.

STEP 2

Make the cream layer by beating the mascarpone, condensed milk and vanilla extract with an electric whisk until thick and smooth.

STEP 3

Break the sponge fingers into two or three pieces and soak in the coffee mixture for a few secs. Put a few bits of the sponge in the bottom of two wine or sundae glasses and top with the cream. Sift over the cocoa and chill for at least 1 hr before serving.

Method

Drain the can of chickpeas, keeping the water. Gently warm in a microwave, then tip into a food processor with the lemon juice, olive oil, tahini, ground coriander and crushed seeds from the cardamom pods. Blend until smooth – add a splash of chickpea water if it's looking a little dry. Check the seasoning and add more oil and lemon juice to taste. Serve sprinkled with toasted pine nuts.
