Last weekend I attended the ON Society dinner here at the School and had the great pleasure of meeting Richard Brooksbank aged 97 pictured to my left above. He attended the School from 1938 to 1942 and was telling me all about the High School during the Second World War. In particular, he told me of a day when a bus arrived full of men looking really tired and bedraggled and it turned out these were men who had been rescued from the beaches at Dunkirk. It really brought home to me the long history of the School and it was fantastic at the same event to see some of our current students doing such a fantastic job supporting our catering team at the event. It is amazing to think that some of those waiting on would be at such a dinner in 70 years time!

This week we submitted our bid to run a school in Singapore which we hope will bring in an income that we can invest back here in Nottingham. All being well we will be invited to an interview before the end of term and then should hear fairly guickly after that as to whether we have been successful.

Yesterday saw one of our regular governors' meetings. 
The music department has been really busy in the past couple of weeks and I am very much looking forward to next week's Spring Concert. Do look at all the photos in this newsletter of the recent events.

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Year 7 had a PSHE session led by the charity Equation called Healthy and Healthy Relationships this week. # Head of Year 8 - Dr Matthew Lakin



On Friday 1st March, the Year 8s took part in the JCB Machine of the Future Challenge on their Activity Day. This involved Y8s working in groups making, designing, creating, and problem-solving a JCB machine of the future. The task involved group work, each led by a project manager, and each group produced detailed, imaginative, and thorough plans for their machine. A key aspect of the brief was to consider the environmental sustainability of their machine, and how it could improve the lives of future generations. The day concluded with a presentation, where each group defended and explained their proposed machine, and the external speakers commended the articulacy and verbal sophistication of the Y8s. Unfortunately, we cannot all be winners; the winning team, Team 18 – Sophie B, Mahd J, Hattie J, Ives L, Ethan M, and Naly N – were absolutely outstanding as they engaged the audience, thought creatively and inventively about their machine, and most closely, of all the teams, complied with the original research brief. I was hugely impressed with the Y8's engagement on the day.

# Head of Year 9 - Ms Marquez-Godoy



Year 9 have enjoyed a busy week, including their remote parents' evening. We hope that the evening was informative, and that you were able to conduct any necessary conversations – particularly in regards to Year 10 options.

Over the past week, Year 9 have enjoyed a number of successes, with students competing in Netball at the weekend, winning against Mount St. Mary's on Saturday and reaching third place in the U15 tournament on Saturday. Furthermore, Clea S. continues to excel in Showjumping, representing Nottingham High School at the UK Schools competition at 1.1m height with an all clear 12 jump round.

Finally, Year 9 attended an assembly last week about the importance of upholding the school's standards of behaviour. ## **CANSAT COMPETITION**

On Monday 4th March a very excited group of year 12 students set off for the CANSAT regional finals. The CANSAT competition is new to the school this year and run by the Design and Technology department, teams have to design and build a satellite the size of a drinks can that is capable of measuring different parameters, like temperature, altitude, pressure etc. Not only must their satellites be able to transmit back all the data for

a live feed, but they must survive the 15g it will experience on launch and then return safely to earth without damage. Both teams had a successful day with textbook launches and recoveries (even if some teams had to walk further and negotiate a stream to find it!) and both managed to receive some data from their satellites. Both teams did the school and the department proud, and are already looking forward to the next developments.

# **Computer Science OUCC Final**

The Computer Science department are delighted to share the results of the OUCC final, which took place last week. We had three students who got through to the final, which in itself is an incredible achievement. 80 students from 56 schools took part in the final round of the OUCC. Harry took part in the Juniors category, coming in 2nd place with a incredible score of 64/78. Ives took part in the intermediate age group ending in 9th place overall, he is the youngest in this category so he'll have high hopes for next year! William took part in the Elite age group, where they had a three-way tie for first place with the top students managing to get maximum marks. William came next with a score of 69, (official score of 4th place, but we like to think he came 2nd!) All students get a finalist certificate which is an amazing achievement in its own right as this was from a field of over 400,000 students that started the journey in November's UK Bebras Challenge. As Harry was in the top 3 from in his age group he will be invited to a Prize giving ceremony to be held in Oxford later this year.



# **Community Action**

As part of the recent Activities Day, Year 9 and 10 Community Action students acted as Teaching Assistants in two local primary schools for the day: Edna G Olds Academy and Huntingdon Academy. Not only was this an excellent opportunity to have an impact on their local community, it also provided students with some excellent work place experience. Dawood and Emma describe their experiences below:

On Friday, I spent Activities Day as a teaching assistant at Edna G Olds Academy. I spent the day helping out Year 6 with their studies. The teacher asked me to help students who were struggling with the work that was given to them, which was mainly preparation for their upcoming exams (SATs). Some of them were quite shy, so it was a bit harder to communicate with some of them. However, nonetheless, they were very kind and welcoming. The highlight of my day was when one of the students explained to me A-level topics, which blew me away. My greatest challenge was communicating with some of the shyer kids, however I was able to overcome this challenge by introducing myself and telling them some funny stories. One skill I developed as a result of the day was my communication and listening skills. Dawood, Year 10.

On Activities Day, I did some individual reading with Year 5 children at Huntingdon Academy for the whole day. I found working with younger children quite fulfilling as, with my aid, they overcame challenges during reading, such as pronunciation issues and punctuation issues, and by the end of their session a lot of them were able to pronounce words correctly. Many of the children met me with a smile on their face, which I found very rewarding. There were many highlights of the day. One of them was reading with one particular child who, after I asked her whether she wanted to read the next chapter, replied with an eager "yes" and continued to read for many more chapters until I regrettably had to stop her. Another was overhearing a child say I was "really nice" - my biggest compliment of the day. There were no particular challenges - starting out was quite difficult, and I was unsure of how to greet the children, but I soon got into the flow of it. As a result of this day, I have developed, of course, the skill of working with children, but also the skill of communication; I had to think carefully about how to greet each child, and how to seem not intimidating but not frightened either. Overall, it was a tiring but very rewarding experience. Emma, Year 9.

# **Update from the Director of Sport**



Last week Miss Bray and I were fortunate enough to attend the largest gathering of Directors of Sport in the UK ever at the PADSIS conference in Oxford.

There were multiple internationally recognised speakers to inspire and inform the group, and many things for us to take away.

Two of the presenters have written books recently, James Kerr's book Legacy, What the All Blacks can teach us about the business of life, and Dr Daniel Lieberman's (Harvard based Paleoanthropologist) Exercised: Why something we never evolved to do is healthy and rewarding are two books well worth a look.

One looks at a cultural influence on behaviours, underlining the importance of knowing who you are and where you come from, the other looks at exercise from an evolutionary point of view and explains why it can be hard to commit to it, but why it is important to do so.

We can all take lessons from the information these authors provide.


