Dear Parents,

I am writing this ahead of the last few days of term because I will be in Singapore from Monday to Friday attending an interview with respect to the School we hope to open there. We are delighted to have this opportunity and should hear by April whether our application to run the School has been successful.

There have been many highlights since I last wrote. It was brilliant to see our Under 14 Boys Hockey Team become Tier 2 National Champions winning through a tough group to go on to a final which they won 1-0. A few years back we took a strategic decision to focus on hockey as a major sport in the School and have invested both in the facilities at Highfields but also in the coaching and so to see this all culminate in a national title was particularly pleasing. Biology, Chemistry and Physics Department

Curiosity Cabinet







In March, the Curiosity Cabinet has been taken over by the three science departments for a celebration of 'weird' science. Our exhibit focuses on some of the more unusual, surprising or simply ground-breaking experiments and research from the scientific world.

Highlights to look out for in the Biology portion include: a consideration of the radioactivity of a banana (a display which incorporates an actual banana decaying in real time), a selection of our carnivorous plants, an exploration of some historic hoaxes, an ethical view on experiments that have taken advantage of different groups of people and a fascinating study on animal counting and whether they have an understanding of zero. So if you've ever wondered if any government agencies have ever researched the use of drugs as truth serums and mind control tools, look no further! Answers for the curious lie in wait within the cabinet...

In the chemistry section we posed the question "What would you say is the worst invention of all time?" Our suggestion was that of two molecules (chlorofluorocarbons and tetraethyllead) which have the dubious honour of both being developed by the same chemist! Another molecule that appears in the cabinet is that of ibuprofen, first synthesised here in Nottingham. Pupils could discover the story of one of the most used drugs in the world and how it was developed on our doorstep.

Over time pupils can watch a crystal garden grow in the cabinet, as well as a single copper sulphate crystal. Both are activities that were completed at the lower school Chemistry Club.

Finally, we couldn't resist putting Marie Curie in the Curiosity Cabinet! With this month also being Women's History Month, pupils can learn about the amazing story of the first woman to be awarded a Nobel Prize, first person to win it twice and the only person to win it twice in two different scientific fields!

On the physics side, we have thought provoking artefacts such as Crooke's Radiometer and the Galilean Thermometer, in addition to the 'floating paperclip' that has been a crowd pleaser. The Geiger Counter placed in the cupboard will also pick up the radioactive decay of the potassium isotope K-40 in the decomposing banana provided by the Biology Department.

In addition to this you will also see a Wimshurst Machine – these were used in the 19th century for physics research into x-rays and also in military medicine. We are also proud to display a leaf from the apple tree at the house of Sir Isaac Newton in Woolsthorpe, the place where he first thought of his Universal Law of Gravitation.

Last call for Munich trip deposits

For the academic year 2024-25, the Philosophy, Religion and Ethics department are pleased to be able to offer an exciting opportunity to students of Years 9-13, the chance to visit Munich. This trip directly links to both the GCSE and A-Level Religious Studies specifications but also encourages curiosity of politics, history, culture, and art, showcasing the versatility of our subject.

The trip costs £675 per person, this includes transport to London Heathrow Airport from and back to school, all flights (current operator is British Airways), 4 days away on a half-board basis, all excursions, and travel between these excursions. You will need to bring a small amount of money for additional spends on meals and drinks. Planned excursions include a visit to Dachau Concentration Camp, Marienplatz, Residenz and Neuschwanstein Castle. Within Munich city, there will be a chance for exploration and attend the Hitler and Third Reich guided tour, view the Munich Holocaust Memorial plaques, and see St Michael's church.

Final deposits are due at the end of term please.

Ellie has been nominated for the Community Champion award as part of Three's WeSeeYou Network. This award is for women who work and volunteer to grow women's football.

This was her nomination:

"Ellie deserves to be seen because she has a huge passion for equality and social justice. From a young age, Ellie initiated fundraisers at Nottingham High School to raise money to send young girls to school in Ghana. Alongside this, she introduced a long standing partnership with The Rosie May Foundation in sixth form which raises money to pay for safe transport to school for girls in Sri Lanka. Ellie also helped initiate diversity campaigns in her school for LGBTQIA+ and ethnic minorities, she made 150 essentials bags for the homeless, took part in toy collections for inner city schools & voluntarily spent a day serving underprivileged kids a Christmas meal.

On top of all of this, Ellie volunteered as a coach in her spare time for Nottingham Forest in the Community.

Ellie is the Her Game Too Ambassador for Nottingham Forest, where she is working with the club to create a women's supporters' club.

Despite only being 20 years old, Ellie has achieved so much and made such a positive impact on the community already. She is such an amazing human and worthy of this nomination!"

Since being nominated, she has focused on Garibaldi Girls and, as part of that, was invited to speak on the panel of Nottingham Forest's, Harvard University's and Lilian Thuram Foundation's Racism and Gender Inequality in Football 2 day conference. UEFA and UN delegates were in attendance as well as much of Forest's first team, women's team, Thierry Henry, Viv Anderson, John McGovern, Lilian Thuram, Lewis Grabban, Wes Morgan and many more.

She's also Nottingham Forest's Her Game Too ambassador. Her Game Too are an international organisation focused on tackling sexism in sport. They have won the Gold award at the FCAs for two consecutive years in the Women in Football section and this year also the EDI award as well as being nominated at the National Diversity award for EDI alongside huge campaigns such as Sky×Women in Football.

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Dear Headteacher, parents or guardians,

This letter contains important health information

I am writing to inform you that the UK Health Security Agency (UKHSA East Midlands Health Protection team) has identified an increase in confirmed or suspected cases of whooping

cough (pertussis) in school age children in the Nottingham and Nottinghamshire areas.

Individual cases have been provided with advice, but we would like to take this opportunity to raise awareness regarding vaccination and symptoms of whooping cough to be aware of.

Symptoms

Whooping cough is caused by infection with pertussis bacteria. For most school-age patients, symptoms will resolve over a number of weeks, while for some, coughing can persist for a few months.

The symptoms of pertussis include:

- a cough lasting several weeks following initial cold-like symptoms
- prolonged bouts of coughing ('paroxysms')
- post-coughing retching or vomiting
- a 'whoop' sound on breathing in
- rib pain

Untreated pertussis is no longer infectious after 21 days but with appropriate antibiotic treatment this reduces to 48 hours.

Advice for parents or guardians

If your child has any of the symptoms described above, we advise you seek medical advice from a GP and take along this letter.

Your GP may then arrange testing for whooping cough.

Your GP can also prescribe antibiotics without waiting for test results. Antibiotics are not required if there has been more than 21 days of coughing. Whooping cough is no longer infectious from 48 hours of starting appropriate antibiotics, but your child should stay isolated at home until they have had 48 hours of antibiotic treatment.

Whooping cough is spread through respiratory droplets: coughing into tissues and washing hands with soap and water can reduce spread.

If your child missed any of their infant or pre-school vaccines, we recommend that you arrange catch-up vaccination through your GP practice as soon as possible. If your child is up to date with their pertussis vaccination, we do not advise any further boosters. It is still possible for fully vaccinated children to develop whooping cough (although the illness is generally milder) so if your child develops symptoms they should be taken to the GP for advice.

At-risk groups

Whooping cough is of most concern in unimmunised infants when it can be life threatening. Vaccinations to prevent whooping cough are routinely given to infants, pre-school children, and pregnant women.

We recommend all pregnant women get their routine vaccination against pertussis ideally between weeks 20 and 32 of pregnancy (but can be given from 16 weeks and up until labour if needed) in order to protect their baby.

Those in risk groups or with regular contact with persons in a risk group should consider avoiding events where they may come into contact with those unwell with pertussis.
