MRS SIMPSON'S NEWSLETTER

Dear parents,

This March marks Women's History Month; an important moment in the calendar for us to pause and reflect on the remarkable women who have made history (or should that be her-story) over generations past. Inspired by Miss Griffiths' marvellous World Book Day costume, I was prompted to read a little more about the Suffragette movement in the UK. Whilst the first mass petition for female suffrage was in 1866, the Women's Social and Political Union (WSPU) was established in Manchester in 1903 by Emmeline and Christabel Pankhurst, and it was the members of the WSPU specifically who became known as Suffragettes. Indeed, the narrative around the suffragette movement have historically focused on the Pankhursts and Emily Wilding Davison, but there are countless other women who played a pivotal role in the fight for female suffrage. Whilst we acknowledge the important work of these women it feels right this Women's History Month to also shine a spotlight on women from more diverse backgrounds who also contributed significantly, often known as the "forgotten suffragettes".

Princess Sophie Duleep Singh was the daughter of Maharaja Duleep Singh and was also Queen Victoria's goddaughter. She contributed financially to the cause of the suffrage movement by selling off her own possessions and famously threw herself at the Prime Minister's Car holding a banner saying "Give Women the Vote". Rosa May Billinghurst was a polio survivor who used a modified tricycle for mobility. She was also heavily involved in the female suffragette movement, founding the Greenwich branch of the WSPU and becoming its first secretary. She was imprisoned at Holloway for throwing a brick during one protest, and was sentenced to one month's hard labour.





Why do we need to celebrate Women's History Month? Is it really necessary in 2024? It is my view that through its celebration today, we acknowledge that such figures were not always given the recognition or respect they deserved. It is through our study of such people, particularly those lesser known characters, that we can truly reflect and honour those who came before us. As proudly co-educational and extremely diverse school community, celebrating those who contributed to our history is paramount and continues to impact our children and their way of thinking. Mr Cordy told me recently that he taught a Philosophy for Children class at the Junior School last term at which he worked hard to showcase a range of diverse philosophers. In week one, the philosopher chosen was male. In week two, female, and so on. One female pupil was absent week two, and upon learning in week three that the philosopher was male, she asked Mr Cordy why we only study male philosophers. He was able to clear up with her that this was not the case, and a classmate filled her in on the philosopher covered the week before, but her willingness to stand up for diversity and question the status quo was impressive. Our children at the Infant and Junior School are intellectually curious and not afraid to ask if they don't think something is quite right. Their commitment to diversity and inclusion is impressive, and through the "I am empowered" strand of our Roadmap they are not afraid to stand up for what they believe in. I am sure that this pupil's foremothers would have been mightily impressed with her question!

Head Lice

Following two recent case of head lice in school, it is important that children are checked on a weekly basis so that any head lice can be dealt with quickly and before they can be allowed to spread. We would ask you to check your child's head as soon as possible. Please follow the simple routine below to ensure that you are doing all you can to keep head lice outbreaks to a minimum.

- · Your child's hair once a week.
- · Use a proper detection comb to trap head lice.
- · If you find live lice, consult a pharmacist for treatment advice.
- \cdot If head lice are spotted, take a close look at all the family. TREAT
- · Please treat your child with a clinically proven treatment.
- · Leave the treatment on for the recommended time for maximum effect.
- · Repeat the treatment for a second time seven days after the original treatment to kill any eggs that may hatch after the first treatment.
- · Check that all head lice have gone within two to three days of the final application of head lice treatment to complete the process.
- · Continue to check for head lice on a regular, weekly basis.

The final will take place on Friday 10th May. Pupils will be notified if they have been successful in gaining a place in the final by the end of the week beginning 22nd April 2024.







We're happy to announce the start of Physio sessions as part of the wider range of services the Centre offers to both students and parents.

Run by experienced physiotherapist Alex Lamb from <u>Coach House Physio</u>, sessions will take place between 1pm and 5pm on Wednesdays. Students will be able to attend sessions during lesson time or after school, with parental permission. Please note that parents must be able to attend these sessions in person alongside their child (including those over the age of 18).

Each 40-minute session, which will include assessment and treatment, costs £45. Mr Lamb also works with private health insurance providers.

Parents and staff are also welcome to use this service at the same rate of £45 per 40-minute session. If these sessions take place after 4pm, parents are welcome to keep children in our wrap-around care until the end of your appointment. All appointments can be booked in <u>advance via this form</u>.
