Dear parents,

As the Spring Term comes to a close for the Easter Holidays, I reflect on all the wonderful things our IJS pupils have achieved this term. Whether it be mastering fronted adverbials, perfecting Grade 1 piano scales or making and developing new friendships this term, every child should be enormously proud of what they have achieved. As teachers, we often see the "new year" as commencing in September rather than January, for this is when the fresh exercise books are distributed and brand-new plans are made for the year ahead. The 1st January seems rather less significant in comparison. Nature, of course, adheres to its own timetable. The magnolia tree at the bottom of my garden declares the start of springtime with its magnificent blossom; a sight I look forward to each and every year. Spring, like September and January, also heralds the start of something new, and there is perhaps comfort in having multiple chances for a new start throughout the year.

For this final edition of the Waverley for the term I thought I would share some of the quirkier Easter. Traditions which exist in countries around the world. In Australia, rather than chocolate eggs or bunnies, it is chocolate bilbies which are exchanged. The bilby is a rabbit – like animal native to Australia which is endangered. The exchange of chocolate bilbies serves to raise awareness of this species and what can be done to help its survival. Whilst it might be tricky to obtain a chocolate bilby in Nottingham this Easter time, many of our children know lots of facts about other endangered species and could reflect on their challenges as they enjoy some chocolate treats.

In some French towns, communities come together to make enormous omelettes in the town square which feed the whole population for much of the day. The idea here is that of coming together and serving one another. Some of our older Junior School pupils might be able to learn to make an omelette this Easter, and treat parents with a home-cooked breakfast in honour of this particular tradition!

Norwegians treat Easter as a crime novel holiday, enjoying mystery books and watching crime dramas together as a family. As a reading school, this is a clear tradition to attempt to uphold, and I know many of our avid readers will relish getting stuck into the mystery genre. My recommendations would include Bob and the Moon Tree Mystery by Simon Bartram for Lovell House pupils and Pages and Co: Tilly and the Bookwanderers by Anna James for Juniors.

Finally, a beautiful Easter tradition hailing from Bermuda is to fly a kite over Easter time, to nod to the concept of the ascension but also to foster a sense of togetherness. As I read about this tradition earlier this week, I realised that my own daughters have never yet flown a kite, so this is definitely on our family's list for this school holiday.

I wish you and your children a restful break and if they try out any of the traditions above, I would love for them to come and tell me all about it next term.

Dear Headteacher, parents or guardians,

This letter contains important health information

I am writing to inform you that the UK Health Security Agency (UKHSA East Midlands Health Protection team) has identified an increase in confirmed or suspected cases of whooping cough (pertussis) in school age children in the Nottingham and Nottinghamshire areas.

Individual cases have been provided with advice, but we would like to take this opportunity to raise awareness regarding vaccination and symptoms of whooping cough to be aware of.

Symptoms

Whooping cough is caused by infection with pertussis bacteria. For most school-age patients, symptoms will resolve over a number of weeks, while for some, coughing can persist for a few months.

The symptoms of pertussis include: •a cough lasting several weeks following initial cold-like symptoms •prolonged bouts of coughing ('paroxysms') •post-coughing retching or vomiting •a 'whoop' sound on breathing in •rib pain

Untreated pertussis is no longer infectious after 21 days but with appropriate antibiotic treatment this reduces to 48 hours.

Advice for parents or guardians

If your child has any of the symptoms described above, we advise you seek medical advice from a GP and take along this letter.

Your GP may then arrange testing for whooping cough. Your GP can also prescribe antibiotics without waiting for test results. Antibiotics are not required if there has been more than 21 days of coughing. Whooping cough is no longer infectious from 48 hours of starting appropriate antibiotics, but your child should stay isolated at home until they have had 48 hours of antibiotic treatment.

Whooping cough is spread through respiratory droplets: coughing into tissues and washing hands with soap and water can reduce spread.

If your child missed any of their infant or pre-school vaccines, we recommend that you arrange catch-up vaccination through your GP practice as soon as possible. If your child is up to date with their pertussis vaccination, we do not advise any further boosters.

It is still possible for fully vaccinated children to develop whooping cough (although the illness is generally milder) so if your child develops symptoms they should be taken to the GP for advice.

At-risk groups

Whooping cough is of most concern in unimmunised infants when it can be life threatening. Vaccinations to prevent whooping cough are routinely given to infants, pre-school children, and pregnant women.

We recommend all pregnant women get their routine vaccination against pertussis ideally between weeks 20 and 32 of pregnancy (but can be given from 16 weeks and up until labour if needed) in order to protect their baby.

Those in risk groups or with regular contact with persons in a risk group should consider avoiding events where they may come into contact with those unwell with pertussis.

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

'Diary of a Wimpy Kid - the ugly truth' by Jeff Kinney Reviewed by Grace J. (5A)



PHYSIO SESSIONS

We're happy to announce the start of Physio sessions as part of the wider range of services the Centre offers to both students and parents.

Run by experienced physiotherapist Alex Lamb from <u>Coach House Physio</u>, sessions will take place between 1pm and 5pm on Wednesdays. Students will be able to attend sessions during lesson time or after school, with parental permission. Please note that parents must be able to attend these sessions in person alongside their child (including those over the age of 18).

Each 40-minute session, which will include assessment and treatment, costs £45. Mr Lamb also works with private health insurance providers.

Parents and staff are also welcome to use this service at the same rate of £45 per 40minute session. If these sessions take place after 4pm, parents are welcome to keep children in our wrap-around care until the end of your appointment. All appointments can be booked in <u>advance via this form</u>.
