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## A MESSAGE FROM THE HEAD

Dear Parents,

I want to start by reminding you all that attendance at the Founder's Day Service on Saturday is compulsory. This is an important part of celebrating the history and tradition of the School as well as in thanking those who have contributed financially to support the School over the years. It is always held on the Saturday closest to 16th June and I hope that we will have your support in ensuring that students attend.

We are now entering the very busy end of term period with a large number of school events still to come. Amongst these are the Lower School production and then on the eve of the end of the school year the Summer Music Festival. I hope that many of you will come along to support these.

Next week we will be writing to you all to update you on the potential addition by an incoming Labour Government of VAT to school fees. Clearly this is something that is likely to be imposed on us but we will explain the impact that this will have in that letter but please look out for it next week. We hope that it will answer some of the questions that we have been asked in recent weeks.

I want to remind you all that if your child is to leave the School a full term's written notice must be given prior to the start of the term at the end of which your child is to leave. We do have to charge a term's fees in lieu of notice if this notice isn't given not least because the School sets its budgets around the number of students we are expecting to be here each term. Notice though can be given provisionally if you are unsure about your plans but please do give us the notice at the earliest possible stage so as to avoid paying for a full term after your child departs. Thus, the earliest that your child could leave without having to pay a full term in lieu would now be Christmas.

I hope that you all enjoyed reading the school inspection report that I circulated earlier this week. We were delighted that our visitors were so impressed with all of our provision and also that we were fully compliant in all areas.

It has been such a pity this year that the summer term has been blighted by such poor weather. I hope that it will improve in the coming days so that all of our outdoor activities can go ahead as planned.

### Cyber Champion News



Earlier this year, around 60,000 students across the country took part in the Cyber Explorers Cup, an initiative led by the UK Government to compete in cyber security challenges as part of a team. We were very proud that Nottingham High School came second, with a team of four- Isaac, Ebu, Ben and Ives from Year 8 and 9. Ives has received a special commendation from the SCQF, for his participation and for exceeding the Cyber explorers requirements, earning himself the Cyber Champion Certificate! Well done Ives!

## Year 10 Biology Field Trip



On May 24th, we returned to Perlethorpe Environmental Studies Centre on the edge of the beautiful Thorsby Estate for our annual GCSE Biology field trip with year 10. Despite the pounding rain of the first half of the week, we were treated to a dry and unexpectedly bright day. The students were able to carry out required practical work towards the ecology part of their course. This included identifying plants at various stages along a transect across a meadow, entering a stream to assess the effect of pollution on aquatic invertebrate species and comparing species diversity in grassland versus woodland. While we missed our usual centre activity leader, the legendary Keith, it was a lovely surprise to have our former colleague Mrs Rachel Adams, assisting us with the stream activity. The students engaged well with the tasks and enjoyed their time out in nature.

## Year 10 Design and Technology visit Nottingham University



On the 7th June all year 10 and year 12 Design and Technology students headed off to Nottingham University to visit the engineering department. Whilst there they had the opportunity to look at the Product Design course and learn about the engineering that goes into the design and manufacture of everyday products we use and take for granted. During the visit they were lucky enough to see the final year student's degree show, which showcased their final year projects.

These ranged from camping heaters through to autonomous sea rescue vehicles. It was an exciting opportunity for our students who are just about to embark on their Non-Examined Assessment to get inspiration from other sources and look at work that they can aspire too. For the year 12 students it gave them plenty of food for thought about future courses and the importance of Industrial/product designers.

After a tour of their impressive facilities the students faced a challenge that is set to their first-year designers, build the tallest freestanding tower using limited materials that is able to support a mass of 100gms for 15 seconds. There were various levels of success, but the level of fun and engagement was high with the winning team being awarded a box of celebrations! It was a very worthwhile visit and gave the students plenty to think about as they start the challenging journey through their NEA coursework.

June 2024

Year 8 Creative Day is dedicated to nurturing the diverse talents and creative abilities of our students. From robotics to baking, musical theatre to music production, and even the digital artistry of Fortnite, our Year 8 students have delved into a myriad of enriching activities. Here's a detailed look at their incredible day.

Our budding engineers were introduced to the fascinating world of robotics. The students worked collaboratively to design, build, and program their own robots. Under the guidance of Dr Jowsey and Dr McKenna, they learned about the basics of circuitry, sensors, and coding. ## YEAR 8 – CREATIVE DAY ARTISAN BAKE OFF (BY SAMIA A S, CHLOE C AND KATE T)

After nearly a week of exams, Year 8 had a wonderful Activities day to look forward to on Friday 8th June 2024. One of the activities available and in high demand was Artisan Baking, and with that the Year 8 take on our very own Great Nottingham High School Bake Off!

First, we were split up into two groups and after partnering ourselves, we started off with making the dough for the Chelsea buns after a thorough demonstration from Amelia Wells, the visiting Artisan Baker. To comprise the perfect dough, we had to ensure we had an array of skills in measuring, teamwork, kneading, and recognizing when the dough was ready. After leaving our dough in an airtight sealed container, we proceeded to receive another demonstration on how to create the focaccia dough. With similar skills from the Chelsea buns fresh in our minds, for me, I felt the focaccia was a more familiar challenge, and this boosted my confidence as well as dough making skills. After this dough had set, we got to put flavour and vitamin elevating ingredients, and I put some parsley and cherry tomatoes to resemble a tree, an effective design that the judges adored!

After a well-deserved brektime, we melted some chocolate and butter from scratch to kick start the chocolate brownie making process! The patience we had to sustain whilst melting these elements gave us a thorough insight on what the artisan style truly meant. It was worth it for the tempting smell of chocolate that filled the air! Whilst the brownies baked, we started to make the vanilla cupcakes! This well-known flavour was a safe bet for the judging and gave us versatility in the decorations we wanted to use!

After lunch, and a skilful demonstration from Amelia on the key secrets to piping, many of us opted for distinctive icing designs to broaden our baking horizons, impressing the judges.

Kate T and I won the prize for the artisan cupcakes. We had lots of fun both designing and making these, and we would love to make them again. We were inspired by a summery beach design, as it is very close to the holidays, and it reminds us of the seaside. Our cupcakes resembled a beach theme, doing half of them with the sea and half of them of the beach. We used cocktail umbrellas and fondant in shells to create some of the decorations, as well as crushed up custard creams and buttercream for the sand and sea. Samia also had a special mention for her skill and passion for the day of baking, and she created some scrumptious bakes as well.

We all had an amazing day of artisan baking. I personally enjoyed decorating our cupcakes as we got to explore different skills such as piping the icing and finding ways which made our decorations look realistic. My partner and I were able to try lots of new techniques with the piping such as making swirls and ruffles which definitely helped improve our cupcake's final presentation. Besides the skills we had gained, we all thought that the brownies and cupcakes were absolutely delicious. The brownies had a rich, chocolate flavour whilst the cupcakes were very moist. After a hardworking afternoon of baking, it finally came to the judging. We all felt very excited as well as being nervous as the judges gathered around each of our tables to inspect our treats. We were thrilled when the judges announced that we had won. Overall, we had a splendid experience and had lots of fun.

## Update from the Library

Students in Y12 met with the school's Antiquarian book experts on Wednesday 12th June to hear about the world of Antiquarian collections through some of the oldest books in the Library (well, Archive now). Alongside the 1784 Foxe's Book Of Martyrs, a Protestant polemic created at the time England was at war with the Catholic countries Spain and France, our visitors Anke Timmerman and Mark James of Type and Forme, Grantham, discussed how the collection came to be created for the school when it was in Stoney Street and showed other important local history publications we now hold. They explained how and why the books were created and also touched on the fact that the most valuable holding in the Archive was not the oldest or the most grand. An insight into what we can learn through the history of book creation about knowledge and learning, and another little known career pathway after Degree for book lovers of any discipline.

# SUMMER TRAINING PROGRAMMES - MR DRUMMOND



We are into the final fitness training block of the year in the school Fitness Suite, and Summer Holidays training programmes are currently being created and will be available via Google Classrooms for students to access.

Similar to previous years, there will be programme templates for students to follow to prepare physically for Autumn Term rugby and hockey, but also general fitness training programmes to maintain, or even develop, strength and fitness levels over the long holiday period. There will be programmes suitable for those with full gym access, those with some equipment, and those who rely on training with bodyweight only. Training interventions provided by the school will always consider previous experience (training age), underlying health issues and/or current/previous injuries, and both the chronological and biological ages of the students.

As a result of the work we put in throughout the year educating students on safe and appropriate fitness training interventions in Health-Related Fitness (HRF) blocks in PE, students should be familiar with the range of exercises provided. They should also feel confident in their abilities when working with external resistance (barbells, dumbbells and resistance machines). If, however, any parents or guardians have any questions or concerns about youth resistance training, please do not hesitate to get in touch.

## Strength training for adolescents

Professor Rhodri Lloyd, a Professor of Paediatric Strength and Conditioning at Cardiff Metropolitan University, has published three books and over 110 peer-reviewed manuscripts on strength and conditioning for children and adolescents. Alongside guidelines for training, he has often highlighted the benefits of, and dispelled some of the common misconceptions around strength training for youths:

Appropriate strength training for youths...

- Stimulates bone mineralisation
- Increases bone density
- Strengthens connective tissue
- Improves CV fitness
- Improves mental health and self-confidence
- Helps encourage lifelong engagement in fitness

Appropriate strength training for youths does not....

- Damage joints or growth plates
- Stunt growth or cause deformations
- Create muscle imbalances
- Have a higher risk of injury (than most sports)
- Adversely affect body image

### Sixth Form MFL Trip to London



On the 9th June, we were fortunate enough to go on an MFL trip to London with a focus on broadening our artistic and cultural knowledge. After an early start to make the bus, we had some breakfast in a café before heading to our first destination: the Freud Museum in Hampstead where he lived and died. Although the Latin America exhibition was targeted at Spanish students, it was interesting to see the evolution of Freud's personal life and psychoanalytical development. Afterwards, we took the tube south to the Tate Modern to view an exhibition displaying works by the influential expressionist group, Der Blaue Reiter (The Blue Rider), who were one of two groups to create the 19th century German Expressionist movement. It was inspiring to see works from artists such as Wassily Kandinsky, Franz Marc, and Gabriele Münter as we have studied their impact during a module on art and architecture. The final stop of the day was the National Gallery to see some French impressionist paintings. The intricacy and detail in these paintings fascinated us and allowed us to understand exactly what the artist wanted to convey. Our favourite painting was 'A Shipwreck in Stormy Seas' by Claude-Joseph Vernet - we were captivated by how he managed to preserve such a specific moment so accurately. We had a brief stop in Covent Garden before having to head home. Thank you to Mr Beattie for making this trip possible!
